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

# Persepolis Harem



The Harem is interconnected with the Throne Hall, Treasury and the Council Hall via stairs.

There's a stairwell on the far West wing that connects the Harem with the Kings' Palaces.

A drainage shaft was found in the western wall of a room near the Council Hall which is connected to the drainage canal leading away from the Harem court yard.

King Xerxes is depicted wearing informal attire on the walls of the central section of the Main Wing. This is apparent because no additional imprints of previously attached jewels are in the painting. Everywhere else in the palace Xerxes is extravagantly dressed.

The queen's quarter's are presumed to be at the central section of the Harem or even one of the Palaces known as G

### PF 684

17.6 marriš (of) wine, supplied by Ušaya, (the woman) Radušnamuya received for Rations. (For) a period of 4 days. She carried a sealed document of the king. 23<sup>rd</sup> year, twelfth month.

This tablet shows that women were trusted with important documents.

· Irdabama ordered the largest amount of wine out of the entire royal family, including King Darius. (2360 quarts of wine)

12 (BAR of) grain, supplied by Umaya from (the place) Uzamannaš workers subsisting on rations, Harrinup (women at) Uzamannaš, received as rations. (For) 1 month, the intercalated(?) twelfth, 22<sup>nd</sup> year. 1 man 3. 1 woman 3, 3 women 2. Total 5 workers. Seal 30



Artystone is the daughter of Cyrus II and King Darius I married her to legitimate his right to the throne. She is also the favorite wife and Darius ordered a statue of her to be made out of gold. She owns at least 3 estates.

Irdabama is a member of the royal family but her relationship to the king is unknown. She is also known as the abbamuš and has two scribes working for her.

# Occupations Of Women

Estate Owners: Such as Artystone, Irdabama, and Amisitri. Owning an Estate meant that these women were responsible for people, goods, and land.

Pašap: is a work group made mostly of women and children and on a few occasions men.

Harrinup: is a work group that is mostly women and sometimes a few men. Araššara: is a female who is in charge of the pašap and is a single specialized woman worker.
