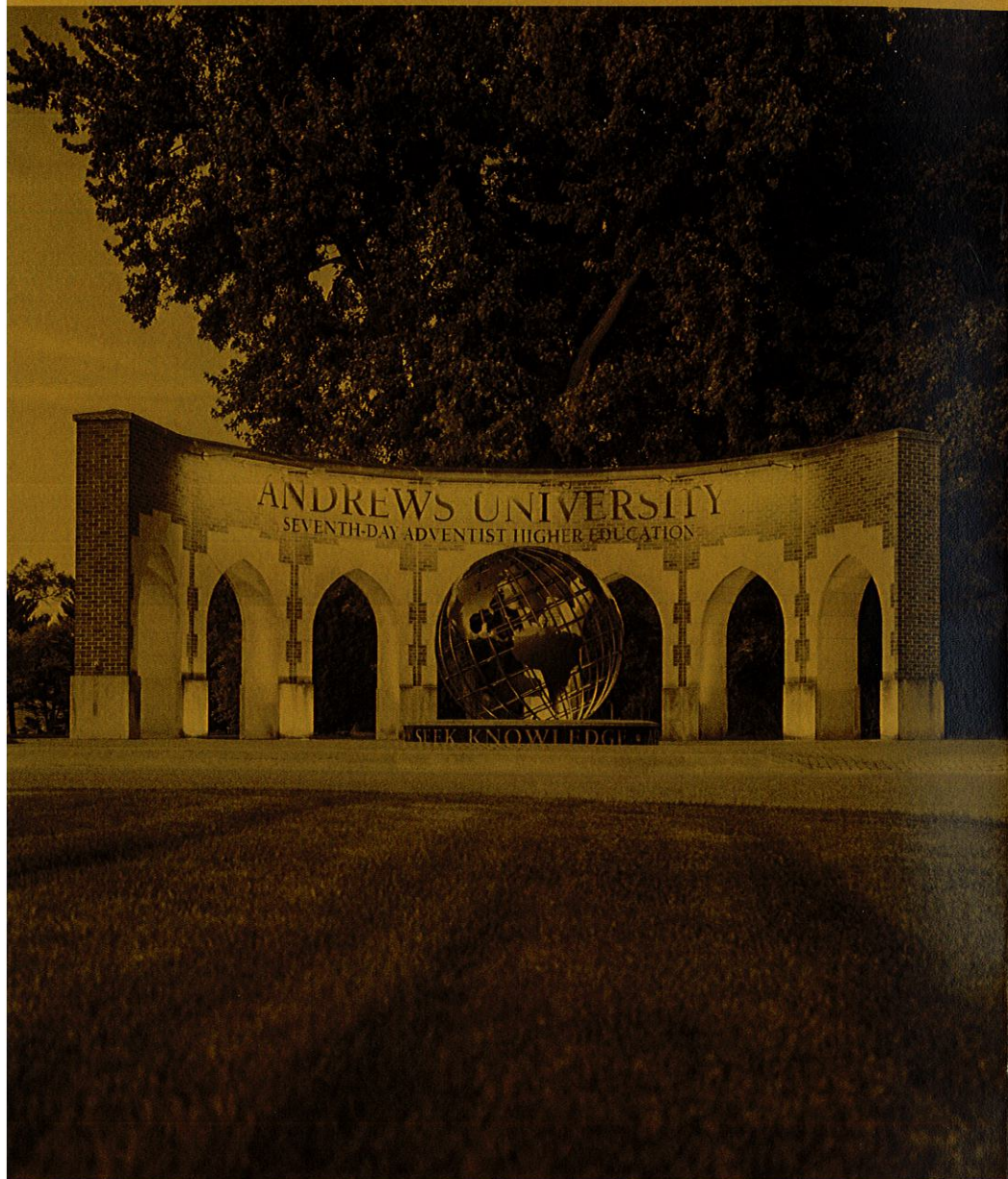

# OUR STORY

**1874**—The story begins with just 12 students of Adventist pioneer, Goodloe Harper Bell, as Battle Creek College, committed to the excellent development of body, mind and spirit.

**1901**—Young teachers and administrators at Battle Creek College, E.A. Sutherland and Percy Magan, in a desire to formulate a new kind of practical educational program, buy property in Berrien Springs and begin Emmanuel Missionary College.

**1960**—To keep up with the burgeoning demands for Adventist pastors and teachers with graduate education, the General Conference Fall Council of 1959 voted to develop a comprehensive university to serve the needs of the world church. Emmanuel Missionary College in Berrien Springs would assimilate the graduate programs and become a General Conference institution, educational servant to the world church. The name Andrews University was chosen to honor the legacy of J.N. Andrews, the leading intellectual of the early Adventist church, and first missionary to be sent outside North America.

**2010**—At the recommendation of the General Conference, in an effort to use distance education to meet the needs of the worldwide constituency, Griggs University (founded by Adventists in 1909 as a correspondence school) merged with Andrews University, expanding the global educational footprint further as the Andrews University School of Distance Education & International Partnerships.

# NEXT CHAPTER

**2016**—Today the Andrews University campus in Michigan is 2,400 acres, offering nearly 200 undergraduate and graduate degrees, serving a global educational community. Andrews is the only Adventist university ranked by the Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education as a National University. “U.S. News & World Report” says that Andrews is one of the most culturally diverse universities in the nation. It is considered the flagship institution of the Seventh-day Adventist educational system.

Building on the foundation of 142 years of Adventist education, we write the next chapter together with our new president, Andrea Luxton. We remain committed to our uniquely Adventist Christian education, with the mission of educating students to

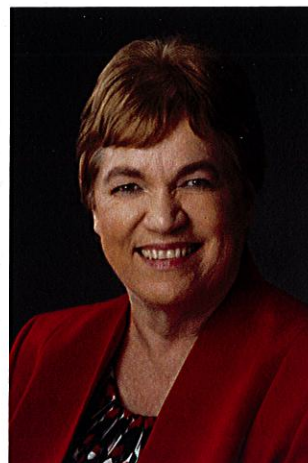

## BIOGRAPHY

# ANDREA LUXTON



Andrea Luxton is the sixth president of Andrews University located in Berrien Springs, Michigan. She joined the faculty in 2010 and served as provost until July 1, 2016, when she assumed her current role. She also holds the rank of professor of English in the College of Arts & Sciences.

Luxton was born in Watford, Hertfordshire, the daughter of educators, and early developed a passion for teaching. For her undergraduate studies, Luxton attended Newbold College, Bracknell, Berkshire, England, and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in theology and English in 1977. She continued her studies at Andrews University and completed a Master of Arts in English the following year.

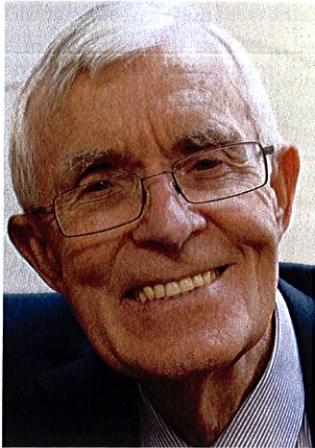
It was at Andrews, a defining moment in her life, that Luxton caught the vision of continuing her academic career. Encouraged by her Andrews' English professors, she eventually applied to doctoral programs and chose to attend Catholic University of America, Washington D.C., where she received her PhD in English in 1986. Her area of specialization is Early Modern literature, and her dissertation is titled "Milton's Hermeneutics: An Intertextual Study of the Epistle to the Hebrews and Paradise Lost." In 1999, she received a postgraduate diploma in institutional management and change in higher education from University of Twente, Netherlands.

Luxton's career began in 1982 when she served as Head of English at Stanborough School in England. From 1986–1991, she worked as lecturer, senior lecturer and chair of the Department of English at Newbold College before serving the British Union as education director, women's ministries coordinator and Sabbath School director until 1993. That year, she became principal at Stanborough School where she stayed until 1997. She then served as president of Newbold College for four years before becoming vice-president for academic administration and professor of English at Canadian University College, Lacombe, Alberta, Canada, in 2001. She became the president of Canadian University College (now Burman University) in 2006, following three years of work as the associate director of education to the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists and executive secretary to the Adventist Accrediting Association.

An avid writer, Luxton has written many professional publications and papers in Canada, England and the United States. She has also written church-related articles for "Signs of the Times," "Adventist Review," quarterlies and other national and international publications.

## BIOGRAPHY

# WILLIAM G. JOHNSON



William G. Johnson, a native of Australia, earned a Bachelor of Chemical Technology from Adelaide University at age 19. After working as an industrial chemist for three years, he sensed a call to ministry and left that vocation to study at Avondale College.

Immediately following his graduation from Avondale, he married Noelene Taylor and they left for India as missionaries. They served 15 years in India, first at Vincent Hill School, then at Spicer College (now Spicer Adventist University), as dean of the School of Theology.

Johnson earned multiple graduate degrees: a Master of Arts in theology, *summa cum laude*,

from Andrews University in 1966, a Bachelor of Divinity from London University in 1969, and a PhD in biblical studies from Vanderbilt University in 1973.

He taught at the Andrews University Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary as a professor of New Testament from 1975–1980 and was associate dean of the Seminary from 1978–1980. He joined the staff of the *Adventist Review* in 1980 and served as the editor of that publication from 1982–2006, the longest tenure in the magazine's history. He was the founding editor of *Adventist World* from 2005–2006.

Johnson continued to serve the Seventh-day Adventist Church as assistant to the General Conference president for Interfaith Relations from 2007–2013. He is currently retired, living in Loma Linda, California, where he continues to write and teach classes in the Loma Linda University School of Religion.

Johnson has published more than 25 books, four on the Book of Hebrews, and more than 1,000 articles. Other notable accomplishments include an honorary Doctor of Divinity from Andrews University in 2007, the Charles E. Weniger Society Award for Excellence in 2015, and an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from Loma Linda University in 2016. He served as the first president of the Adventist Society for Religious Studies (ASRS).

He has been married to Noelene, former director of Children's Ministry for the North American Division of Seventh-day Adventists, for more than 50 years. They have two children, Terry, vice president for the Audi Company, Germany, and Julie, a reporter for Bloomberg News, and two grandchildren.

## Who Was J.N. Andrews?

Convinced in early youth that Jesus was returning soon, J.N. Andrews at the age of 17 embraced the seventh-day Sabbath and thereafter devoted his entire time and talents to the Seventh-day Adventist movement.

Andrews is best remembered as the first official Seventh-day Adventist missionary to work outside North America. The Andrews family departed Boston on September 14, 1874, to Switzerland. Andrews, still grieving the death of his wife Angeline two years earlier, departed as a 45-year-old single parent, accompanied by Charles, 16, and Mary, 12. The children proved to be extraordinary young pioneers, editing translating, setting type, helping tirelessly to establish the international missionary journal, *Les Signes des Temps* (The Signs of the Times).

The foremost intellectual in the early Adventist movement, Andrews made significant contributions to the development of several doctrines, notably the Sabbath, tithing, sleep of the dead, church organization, and the non-combatant status of military draftees. He also served as the third president of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventist (1867–1869). His example set in motion a tide of other missionary, his *History of the Sabbath* persuaded thousands, and his journal gave birth to congregations on three continents.

It was to memorialize his commitment to scholarship and to the worldwide mission of the Seventh-day Adventist church that, in 1960, the Trustees named Andrews University in his honor.

The large trunk on the platform today is the original one the family used for their journey in 1874. The J.N. Andrews Benediction was part of a letter written by Andrews to the readers of the "*Advent Review and Sabbath Herald*."

The smaller trunk on the platform was handcrafted by an Andrews University staff member. It bears a likeness to the trunk of J.N. Andrews and will have a place of honor in President Luxton's office suite. The J.N. Andrews Prayer is engraved on the trunk's plaque and represents 100 Andrews University student leaders who, for each of the first 100 days of this school year, are praying for the new leadership team of Andrews University.

## ACADEMIC REGALIA

The history of academic regalia extends to the earliest days of the oldest universities. European institutions of higher education show great diversity in their specifications of academic dress. When American colleges and universities desired to adopt a suitable system of academic apparel a century ago, it seemed best to agree on guidelines that all might follow. Accordingly, in 1885 an intercollegiate commission drafted an academic costume code for universities in the United States. A revision was made in 1932. A committee on Acetonic Costumes and Ceremonies, appointed by the American Council on Education, has, on different occasions, reviewed the costume and made several significant changes.

The gown for the associate degree is gray in color and styled the same as a bachelor's degree gown. The gown for the bachelor's degree has pointed sleeves. It is designed to be worn closed. The gown for the master's degree has an oblong sleeve, open at the wrist. The gown is designed to be worn open or closed. The gown for the doctoral degree has bell-shaped sleeves. It is designed to be worn open or closed. These gowns are usually black, but the Andrews University doctoral gown is dark blue and trimmed in black velvet with the University seal on the left lapel near the top.

The length of the hood worn for the bachelor's degree, if one is used, is three feet; for the master's degree, three and one-half feet; and for the doctoral degree, four feet. The hoods are lined with the official color or colors of the college or university conferring the degree. The Andrews University hood is lined with dark blue and gold. Inasmuch as members of the Andrews University faculties hold degrees from a large number of colleges and universities, space does not permit identification of each.

The colors of the velvet borders associated with the different fields of learning for degrees and adopted by Andrews University are as follows:

## PRESIDENT'S REGALIA

Current traditions of academic regalia are overseen in the United States by the American Council on Education, including the specification that "for the doctor's degree, the gown is faced down the front with black velvet; three bars of velvet are used across the sleeves."

For university presidents, four bars of velvet are used across the sleeves to indicate the office held by the wearer, as you can see in Andrea Luxton's presidential regalia.

## CHAIN OF OFFICE

Presidential medallions are closely allied with maces and seals as traditional symbols of authority. A medallion is typically inscribed with the seal of the institution and is worn over academic regalia on ceremonial occasions, particularly at commencements and convocations, and is typically presented to a university's president at her or his inauguration.

Today represents the formal debut of the Andrews University Presidential Medallion of Office, and features the University's seal, which includes the name of the University, its year of founding (1874) and its Latin motto, "Corpus, Mens, Spiritus," or Body, Mind and Spirit—the central and interconnected themes of the distinct educational approach of the University. The medallion also features a custom link, which indicates the presidential office. The medallion is inscribed on the reverse with Andrea Luxton's name and the date of her inauguration.
