

## EDITORIAL

Our AUSS fall issue for 2019 comes in the form of a special edition on worldviews. We are happy to share with our readers interesting articles providing important theological reflection stimulated by an academic conference—Transforming Worldview(s): Biblical Faithfulness in a Pluralistic Age—convened at Andrews University, October 18–20, 2018.

We expect that the articles we present here will have an unmistakable appeal to those who seek to open the Biblical text in meaningful ways to old and new audiences.

First, Flavio Prestes presents a fresh conceptualization of the nature of worldviews as a basis for comparison and contrast of the integration of narratives and concepts in biblical and atheistic evolutionary worldviews.

Second and third, Kevin Vanhoozer provides insightful hermeneutical reflections on pluralism in two articles on being biblical in a pluralistic age and in a pluralistic academy.

Fourth, John Peckham challenges us with his article, on cognitive dissonance and a cosmic controversy worldview, that integrates the reality of the conflict between good and evil into the discourse of worldviews.

Fifth, Boubakar Sanou concludes this collection of articles with his case for worldview transformation through linking biblical exegesis and social location within different worldview contexts.

This issue of our journal also contains helpful reviews of ten recent important books, and eight abstracts from significant research dissertations written by PhD candidates at the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary, at Andrews University.

Finally, we take this opportunity to express appreciation for Sandra Stebenne who served on our editorial team for a few months and helped us to transition to an overall improved workflow. We wish her a successful completion of her academic studies.
