




Father Absence -

A Critical Problem

- More than 27 million children 39 of all US children - now live apart from their father. In a typical year, well over one-third of these children won't even see their dad.
- More than half of all European-American children and three-quarters of all African-American children born since 1975 will live some portion of their formative years with only one parent and in the vast majority of these cases, it's the father who is absent.

Father Absence - - the costs are high

- School dropoutsrepeat grade
- Substance abuse
- Teen pregnancy
- Crime and violence
- Child poverty
- Child abuse/neglect



Father Absence - - the costs are high



- Father-absence is a contributing factor to these kinds of social problems
- Unsuccessful socialization of children.
- Emotional absence
- Teen suicides

Father Absence - - Areas of impact on children

- Academic achievement
- Gender-specific development
- General behavioral adjustment
- Aggression in male children







Father Present -

- The involved father's role
- Fathers are also nurturing
- Availability/Accessibility-physical and emotional presence increase wellbeing
- Day to day care: children social and emotional skills developed during direct care activities bathing/feeding

Father's presence

- Infants have improved cognitive development
- School age children have higher academic achievement
- Fathers involved in schools associated with higher likelihood of a student mostly getting As
- Children who are close to their fathers have higher educational and occupational mobility.
- Father is capable as mother in nurturing and care giving
- Father child bond can parallel mother child bond
- Father's love is as significant as mother regarding positive outcomes for children



- Love



Father and play



- Play- one area where fathers tend to be more involved
- Tend to be vigorous, and physical in play
- Father-child play is associated with higher language and cognitive skills.
- Play helps children to take initiative, explore, take chances, overcome obstacles, self control, deal with setbacks and defeats, self regulation and controlling aggression.
- Coach of children's soccer team
- Family Play night
- Playing with my kids and teaching them different sports

First Principle: Love

Value them —Praise/Affirm often — twice as much as criticism

o Not Flattery



Second Principle: Discipline

Discipline

- Clear boundaries should be set
- Focus on what your child does right
- Rewards are more effective than punishment
- Punishment reserved for rebellion



3rd Principle: Consistency



Consistency

Parent to Parent – must be on same page and agree on training, discipline, rewards, and show no partiality

Pray for wisdom for each Situation to Situation

4th Principle: Example

 First introduction to God is the one we model to our children...are we loving, patient, kind, firm, forbearing, and etc.

- Most values are caught by the example of the Life
- "Do as I say and not as I do" Does not Work! Need true model of life principles



Father must be **ENGAGED** in the Child's Life

- Should be active in parenting
- "Go see your mother" is a copout or vice versa....should both be involved
- Quality always trumps Quantity: Even if busy make dedicated times per day to engage with your children
- Always try to be at special events and meaningful occasions for your child
- Make memories by having enjoyable outings or times, does not need to be costly trips. Your child will enjoy just being with you.
- Trip to Panama and Canada.


Fathers must be willing to discipline their children when they do
